Enabled with a Wi-Fi campus, computer labs and ICT tools the college managed to achieve its teaching-learning objectives. The Time-Table committee drew up a schedule in advance. All the teachers were trained in the NEP Curriculum. The admission Committee counselled the students accordingly.

Assessment was done both internally and externally. The NEP semester system was introduced in the first semester of UG and PG classes. Along with this the annual system was also followed.

Students were also acquainted with the credit- based and choicebased system of NEP. Various extracurricular activities complemented teaching to ensure holistic development.

At Dayanand Girls' P.G. College, various assessment methods such as quizzes, seminars, assignments, and midterm examinations are employed to gauge students' learning levels. A comprehensive approach ensures that all students, regardless of their learning pace, receive assistance and opportunities for growth. Slow learners are provided additional support through remedial sessions, audiovisual aids, and simplified texts, to help them understand the course and succeed. On the other hand, advanced learners are challenged with advanced reading material, challenging research projects, and internship opportunities facilitated by institutional partnerships and MOUs with research organisations. Workshops in diverse fields such as DNA Extraction and PCR, Blood sampling and blood group testing, Mushroom Cultivation, Biofertilizer, Clay Sculpture and ceramic work aid students in exploring career interests. Career guidance programs, job fairs, skill training and vocational programmes aid students in aligning their career paths with their abilities and interests. Guidance for CSIR/UGC NET exams is given at departmental level to support those students who wish to pursue higher education and research.

Beyond academics, students actively participate in literary,

cultural, and sports events, fostering overall development. Annual prize distribution ceremony celebrates outstanding achievers across diverse domains. This multifaceted approach ensures that every student receives the necessary support and opportunities for growth. 2.3 - Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 - Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences

The National Education Policy (NEP) brought about a restructuring of the curriculum and experiential learning was emphasised through workshops, internships, field trips, and practical demonstrations. Workshops/ training on "DNA Extraction and PCR", Sampling of blood, blood group testing, Clay Sculpture and Ceramic Work facilitated experiential learning.

Events like "KRATTIVA Painting Exhibition" and "Cyber Awareness Day," contributed to immersive learning experiences. Workshops on "Mental Health", webinars on "Expression through Music", and participation in the "Ramayana Conclave" broadened students' horizons.

Participative learning involved interactive sessions, discussions, debates, and group projects. Lecture cum Interactive Session on

'Introduction to NEP'" and programmes organised under the "Mission Shakti" project fostered student engagement and leadership development.

Problem-solving methodologies were emphasised through research assignments, projects, and competitions. Students undertook internships with the collaboration of institutes like NBRI, Biotech Park, IIPR, and GSVM. Research assignments on 'Concept of Law of Demand''challenged students to apply economic principles to real-world scenarios, workshops like "Statistical Mechanics" provided problem-solving applications. Quiz on "Aitihasik Adhyayan - Kalkhand - 1857-1964", Essay Competition on "Gandhi Ji Aur Chauri-chaura" and " Religions of the world", Tie and Dye Competition, Cooking Competition, Logo Designing contest for Kanpur City Transport Services Ltd., Painting Competition and Exhibition challenged the students to apply their knowledge, analyse information, and develop innovative solutions.

2.5.1 - Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and mode. Write description within 200 words.

Continuous internal evaluation of students' progress and learning outcomes is done through various assessment activities such as class interaction, quizzes, seminars, assignments, mid term exams, study visits, industrial training, and rural service. Regular incorporation of assessment activities throughout the academic term ensures, facilitating timely feedback and allowing teachers to adapt teaching strategies accordingly.

To maintain transparency, clear guidelines and criteria are established for each assessment component, ensuring that students understand how their performance will be evaluated. In courses under NEP, weightage of continuous internal assessment is of 25 marks both in theory and practicals.For class interaction 05 marks are alloted, Quiz is of 05 marks, Additionally, assessment schedules and expectations are communicated to students in advance, promoting fairness and clarity. Students are alloted topics for their presentation during a student seminar which has a weightage of 07 marks. Assignments and study report of field excursion or industrial visit is of 08 marks.

The mode of assessment varies to accommodate different learning styles and preferences, ensuring a comprehensive evaluation of students' skills and knowledge. The transparent and robust mechanism of internal assessment ensures that students are evaluated fairly and accurately based on their performance across a range of activities, ultimately contributing to their holistic development and academic success.

Recognizing these challenges, the college has established a

dedicated grievance redressal committee to effectively address internal examination-related issues.

In response to student feedback, the college has implemented measures to alleviate the burden. Students are granted flexible assignment submission schedules. Preparatory sessions are organised, including practical rehearsals and comprehensive theory course revisions ahead of internal assessments for students to clarify doubts and enhance their understanding of course material.

Clear guidelines and criteria for each assessment component are provided to students to ensure transparency in grading. Moreover, regular feedback mechanisms offer constructive insights into students' performance. Transparency in evaluation is maintained through the utilisation of internal continuous assessment rubrics outlined in the NEP syllabus.

To further enhance the assessment process, directives from the Principal and IQAC In charge regarding NEP assessment best practices are regularly communicated. Periodic reviews of assessment practices are conducted to facilitate continuous improvement. By addressing student grievances and providing supportive measures, the college ensures a fair and conducive assessment process aligned with students' academic success and well-being.

It helps to relieve red and irritated skin, eliminate rashes, itching and flaking. Antibacterial agents have ingredients that combat bacteria, protects and maintains the integrity of the skin. For this purpose, medicated soap can be formulated with lemon grass and Neem leaves. Herbal extract often has a pronounced therapeutic effect on the skin which makes them excellent medicated soap ingredients. Neem produces a wide range of chemically and structurally complex pharmacologically active phytochemicals. More than 140 compounds have been isolated from different parts of Neem but medicinal use has been described mainly for neem leaf. Lemongrass contains citronella, a natural plant compound with antiinflammatory properties. In soaps the lemongrass extract is also added to create a fresh scent. The therapeutic qualities of the soap are strengthened by natural components, which offer calming and productive skincare advantage.

2.3 - Teaching- Learning Process

The National Education Policy (NEP) brought about a restructuring of the curriculum and experiential learning was emphasised through workshops, internships, field trips, and practical demonstrations. Workshops/ training on "DNA Extraction and PCR", Sampling of blood, blood group testing, Clay Sculpture and Ceramic Work facilitated experiential learning.

Events like "KRATTIVA Painting Exhibition" and "Cyber Awareness Day," contributed to immersive learning experiences. Workshops on "Mental Health", webinars on "Expression through Music", and participation in the "Ramayana Conclave" broadened students' horizons. Participative learning involved interactive sessions, discussions, debates, and group projects. Lecture cum Interactive Session on 'Introduction to NEP'" and programmes organised under the "Mission Shakti" project fostered student engagement and leadership development.

Problem-solving methodologies were emphasised through research assignments, projects, and competitions. Students undertook internships with the collaboration of institutes like NBRI, Biotech Park, IIPR, and GSVM. Research assignments on 'Concept of Law of Demand''challenged students to apply economic principles to real-world scenarios, workshops like "Statistical Mechanics" provided problem-solving applications. 2.5 - Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 - Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and mode. Write description within 200 words.

Continuous internal evaluation of students' progress and learning outcomes is done through various assessment activities such as class interaction, quizzes, seminars, assignments, mid term exams, study visits, industrial training, and rural service. Regular incorporation of assessment activities throughout the academic term ensures, facilitating timely feedback and allowing teachers to adapt teaching strategies accordingly.

To maintain transparency, clear guidelines and criteria are established for each assessment component, ensuring that students understand how their performance will be evaluated. In courses under NEP, weightage of continuous internal assessment is of 25 marks both in theory and practicals.For class interaction 05 marks are alloted, Quiz is of 05 marks, Additionally, assessment schedules and expectations are communicated to students in advance, promoting fairness and clarity. Students are alloted topics for their presentation during a student seminar which has a weightage of 07 marks. Assignments and study report of field excursion or industrial visit is of 08 marks.

The mode of assessment varies to accommodate different learning styles and preferences, ensuring a comprehensive evaluation of students' skills and knowledge. The transparent and robust mechanism of internal assessment ensures that students are evaluated fairly and accurately based on their performance across a range of activities, ultimately contributing to their holistic development and academic success.

Transparency in evaluation is maintained through the utilisation of internal continuous assessment rubrics outlined in the NEP syllabus.

Herbal extract often has a pronounced therapeutic effect on the skin which makes them excellent medicated soap ingredients. Neem produces a wide range of chemically and structurally complex pharmacologically active phytochemicals. More than 140 compounds have been isolated from different parts of Neem but medicinal use has been described mainly for neem leaf. Lemongrass contains citronella, a natural plant compound with anti-inflammatory properties. In soaps the lemongrass extract is also added to create a fresh scent. The therapeutic qualities of the soap are strengthened by natural components, which offer calming and productive skincare advantage.
